The School Health Research Network is a new initiative and the first of its kind in the UK. Our aim is to improve young people's health and wellbeing through generating high quality research evidence about how schools can best protect and support the health of their school community.

The Network will bring schools, researchers and policy makers closer together to ensure that we facilitate research that is relevant and timely and that the evidence we generate is used to inform school health policy and practice.

Working closely with schools, professionals who support school health and policy makers we will develop the structures and processes needed to create a vibrant and effective network that serves the needs of young people in Wales.

The Network is being coordinated by DECIPHer, the Centre for the Development and Evaluation of Complex Interventions for Public Health Improvement.



DECIPHer is a strategic partnership between Cardiff University, the University of Bristol and Swansea University.

 - See a draft school feedback report and discuss its potential



She has worked with DECIPHer on a range of school research projects and supported the Welsh Network of Healthy School Schemes by working with individual schemes and running training and writing resources for the Welsh Government.
